



- 7 months remaining. Reviewing options to wind down program.

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**2025 Legislators – Key Races**


- Legislative District 2 (Phoenix)**  
Sen. Shawna Bolick (R) defeated Rep. Judy Schwiebert (D) to hold onto a Senate seat
- Legislative District 4 (Phoenix)**  
Carine Werner (R) defeated Sen. Christine Marsh (D) to flip a Senate seat to Republican control, and Matt Gress (R) and Pamela Carter (R) defeated Democratic candidates to add one more Republican seat in the House
- Legislative District 9 (Mesa)**  
Very close races threatened incumbents, but Eva Burch (D) kept her Senate seat and Lorena Austin (D) and Seth Blattman (D) narrowly defeated Republican challengers
- Legislative District 13 (Chandler)**  
Sen. J.D. Mesnard (R), Jeff Waninger (R), and Julie Willoughby (R) fended off challenges from Democratic challengers, adding one more Republican seat in the House



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**2025 Legislators – Key Races**

- Legislative District 16 (Casa Grande)**  
Rep. Teresa Martinez (R) won another term and Chris Lopez (R) defeated Rep. Keith Seaman (D) to add a seat to the Republican majority
- Legislative District 17 (Tucson)**  
Vince Leach (R) narrowly defeated John McLean (D) for the Senate seat but Kevin Volk (D) defeated Rep. Cory McGarr (R) to flip a House seat away from the Republican majority
- Legislative District 23 (Yuma)**  
Sen. Brian Fernandez (D) narrowly defeated Michelle Altherr (R) to hold his Senate seat and Michelle Peña (R) overcame a Democratic challenger to retain her House seat



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**2025 Legislators – Committee Chairs**

- Senate Education: Sen. David Farnsworth**
  - Longtime member of the legislature from Mesa
  - Former real estate investor and insurance agent
  - Prior member of the Education Committee, sponsored effort to make school board positions partisan and require each classroom to post the U.S. flag and Constitution
- Senate Health & Human Services: Sen-Elect Carine Werner**
  - Incoming freshman lawmaker from Scottsdale
  - Small business owner
  - No clear health-related campaign policies, except for a focus on substance abuse treatment and mental health services to those who are homeless

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### Assessment of Facilitators and Challenges to Providing Childhood Vaccines

**Overview**

The COVID-19 pandemic exposed critical immunization gaps, highlighting critical gaps in vaccine delivery systems that require targeted strategies to reach underserved populations, using the question: Why are families having trouble finding a vaccine provider when they need one?

**Approach**

Partner survey, literature & challenge to childhood immunizations. Identification of vaccine for children (VFC) program gaps from healthcare provider perspectives. Vaccine Congress identified systemic facilitators, challenges & recommendations through stakeholder engagement.

Partners used the evidence vaccine delivery to understand data.

**Less Workload or Higher Payments Fewer Providers**

**Kids at Risk**

**VFC Policy**

**VFC Challenges**

**Low Reimbursement**

**Vaccine Sustainability**

**Recommendations**

- HHS including vaccine payment issues in top priorities for next 5-year plan.
- Changing VFC admin from cap to floor based on CMS rate.
- CMS toolkits for A, B, D and working toward mirroring coverage across plans.
- Advocacy agencies including payment in all plans and discussions.
  - Centralized form for payment issues 12/2024.
- Development of national VFA program with \$30 admin fee.
- Increase for Community Health Center payments.

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## AZ Vaccine Financing Council

Vaccine Congress & Strategic Plan Feedback

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### To address vaccine payment shortfalls

Low VFC ceiling set in (1996 & 2012)

No additional antigen reimbursement on combo vaccines (Medicaid)

Low margins on private vaccine purchased

New vaccine payment lag (ACA 1 year + 6 months codes loaded)

Limited networks

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### Next Steps?

- TAPI applying for Vitalyst System Change Grant 11/15 to develop the workgroup:
  - Requesting letters of Commitment from active partners. Complete the Wilder Collaboration Factors Inventory.
  - Facilitate workgroup, Vaccine Congress on payment, and policy review.
- Collect data to tell the story:
  - Reporting form for vaccine reimbursement problems.
    - Will be used for health plan advocacy, establishment of trends, telling the story of underpayment, research.
  - Documenting reimbursement process.

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Influenza vaccine




- Recommendation continues: "Routine vaccination for all persons >6 months of age without contraindications"
- Flumist was approved for self-administration on 9/2024.
  - 2024-25 season Flumist will only be available for healthcare provider administration
  - Self-administration → Next season
- Vaccine effectiveness
  - Acute respiratory illness pursuing medical care
  - Vaccination odds among flu confirmed cases vs control cases
  - Vaccination state- records

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Influenza vaccine


- Vaccine effectiveness
  - **Pediatric (59-67%)**
    - Flu A 45-60%
    - Flu B 65-85%
  - **Adults (37-54%)**
    - Flu A 20-45%
    - Flu B 65-75%
  - **Adults 50-65 (40-80%)**
    - Flu A 15-40%
    - Flu B 35-50%
  - **Adults >65 (40-50%)**
    - Flu A 40-50%
    - Flu B 30-65%



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
COVID-19 vaccine

- 2022-23 COVID vaccine provided increased protection against ED/UC visits = decreased after 4-6 months
- RECOMMENDATIONS:
  - **6 mo- 4 y** – Initial series (2 moderna/3 Pfizer) + 1 dose 2024-25 (homologous vaccine optimal)
  - **>5y- 64 y** – 1 dose of 2024-25 (2 months after the last dose); if previously unvaccinated (2 doses)
  - **>65 y** – 2 doses of 2024-25 (6 months apart)
  - **Immunocompromise > 6 mo**- Initial COVID vaccine plus 1 2024-25 vaccine (may add a 2<sup>nd</sup> dose 2024-25)- shared clinical decision making
  - **Vaccine when aging up**- Receive the vaccine dose for the older group
  - **Vaccine interchange**: Only if same vax unavailable, contraindications, previous dose unknown or otherwise would not receive the vaccine.



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Pneumococcal vaccine




- PCV21 (Capvaxine)- covers >80% of invasive pneumococcal serotypes
- Recommendation for "Single-dose PCV21 as an option for persons older than 65 y.o. and for those ages 19-64 y.o with high-risk conditions as an OPTION to PCV20 OR PCV15+PPSV23."
- Phase 3 trial- Patients 2-18 yw/ comorbid conditions
- Next meeting- consider discontinuation of PPSV23

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## Pneumococcal vaccine

**Should single dose PCV vaccine be recommended for PCV naive adults 50-64?**

- Recommendation- Lower the age-based recommendation for all PCV to 50 years of age
- Health equity
- Risk prevalence- 33-54% of adults have at least one indication
- Vaccine coverage- likely to improve uptake
- Simplicity- Easier to implement
- Economic- Potentially lower cost




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## RSV vaccine

Adults >75 y.o.- single dose (or 60-74 y.o. with risk factors)

- **Abrysvo**
  - Studies showed immunity after 2 years
  - Age 18-59 indication under FDA review
- **Arexvy**
  - Potential for revaccination- strong responses if additional dose after 24 months
  - FDA expanded indication 50-59
- **Beyfortus**
  - Effective against ED visits for infants on their 1<sup>st</sup> RSV season
  - SE: Breakthrough infection?, hypersensitivity?

	Beyfortus (Nirsevimab)	Arexvy (GSK)	Abrysvo (Pfizer)
Indicated Age	All infants < 8mo High risk < 19mo	60yo+	60yo+ (or pregnancy)
Effectiveness	75% decrease in medically-attended LTRI	75% reduction in 2+ symptoms	75% reduction in 2+ symptoms
Safe in Pregnancy?	N/A	Untested	Yes; reduces newborn infxns
Mechanism	Monoclonal Ab	pre-fusion F protein w/ adjuvant	pre-fusion F protein




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## RSV vaccine

- **Clesrovimab**- phase 3 vaccine for neonates
  - Provides protection for mild, moderate, severe disease
  - 90.9% efficacy for prevention of hospitalization
  - Additional information requested by the workgroup
- **GSK RSV prenatal vaccine**
  - Initial concerns about preterm births- late preterm (34-37 weeks) AND after 30 days of vaccination- Trial stopped
  - Proven no association with preterm births; still questions about stillbirth, anaphylaxis, GBS, thrombotic events including PE, concerns about gestational HTN
  - Workgroup recommends- messaging about gestational HTN and preterm counseling.

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## Chikungunya vaccine



- **Virus like vaccine (Bavarian Nordic)**- >12 y.o.
  - Adolescents and adults – single dose
  - Phase 3- good immunologic response
  - No adverse events
  - No vaccine efficacy data yet
  - Clinical trial for approval on children ages 1-11
- **Live attenuated (IXCHIQ)**- >18 y.o.
  - Single dose for people traveling to countries with known outbreaks
  - Consider if traveling to countries with no outbreak but cases reported on >65 with medical conditions or staying for > 6 months
  - Laboratory workers

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## Other updates

- **Meningococcal**
  - Men B-4c (Bexsero)- New schedule recommended
    - 2 doses- 0, 6 months
    - 3 doses- 0, 1-2, 6 months (>10 years of age and at increased risk)
- **CMV vaccine**
  - mRNA-1647 CMV vaccine- clinical trial (females 16-40 y)
- **Mpox vaccine (Jynneos)**
  - Clade I; still low risk overall
  - Recommendation is to provide vaccine to travelers, especially to countries with cases if participating in high risk activities

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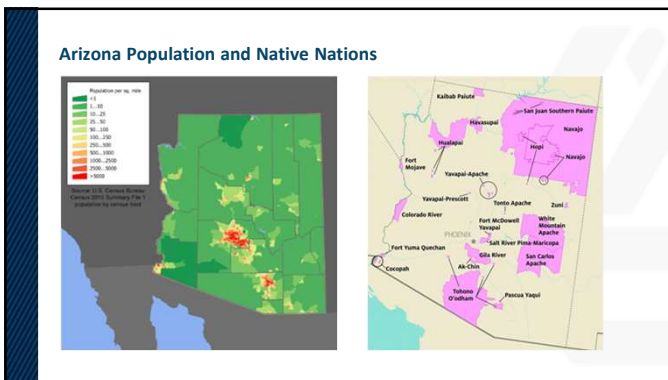

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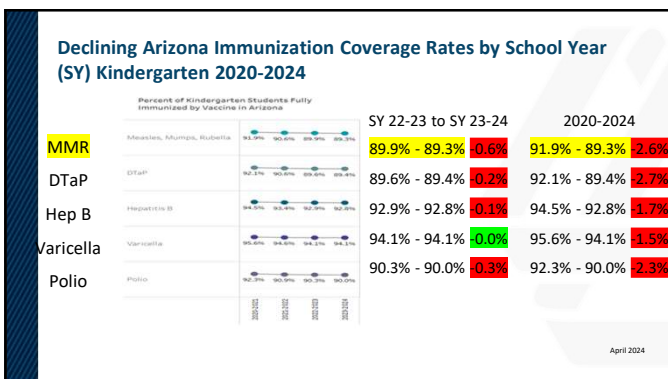


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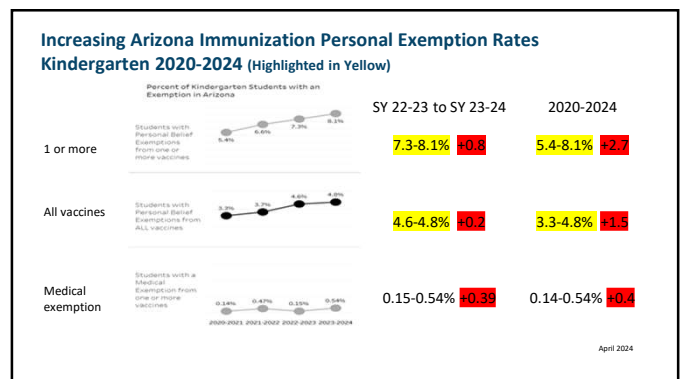
### Problems

- Declining vaccine rates among school children in Arizona leave our most vulnerable students and community members at risk of contracting vaccine preventable infections
- Increasing use of Personal Exemption Forms and concurrent declining vaccination rates of very contagious vaccine preventable diseases such as measles

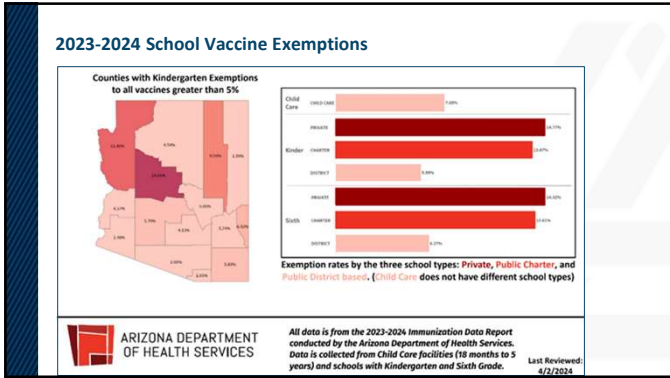
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### Coalition Vision and Initial Goal

- Ensure that all Arizona school age children, including the most vulnerable, have access to life-saving vaccines and reduce the risk of vaccine preventable diseases
- **By the end of 2027, Arizona will have a 2% increase in school vaccine rates and a 1% decrease in personal exemption rates**

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### Data-driven Strategies

- Low vaccination rates and high usage of personal exemptions are school specific regardless of rural or urban settings.
- Target schools with > 20% personal exemption rates which often are charter or private schools.
- Partner with school administration as well as school health staff.

### Health Equity

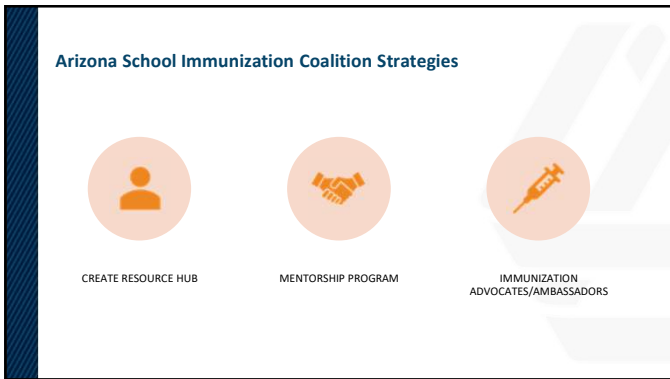
- AZ charter schools have over 2 x average personal exemption use statewide than district public schools
- About half of all charters serve predominantly low-income students

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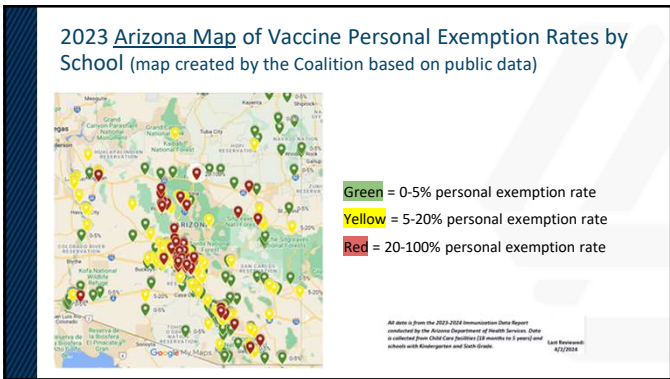
### Partnerships

- national and local advocacy groups

2024 Respiratory Illness Season Messaging

Overview

Although there have been developments to address our upcoming respiratory illness seasons, including Influenza, RSV and COVID-19, the season typically runs from October through March. The flu season usually peaks in February in Arizona.

Flu & COVID-19 Messaging

- Inform the public that both COVID-19 and flu are preventable through vaccination.
  - Americans and others
  - Older adults
  - Immunocompromised individuals
  - Pregnant women
- Boost your natural immune response by staying up-to-date on these vaccines.
- Stay home and quarantine when you develop signs or symptoms. Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- For the best protection, get vaccinated before you get exposed to flu or COVID-19.
- Wash your hands frequently.
- What you can do to stay the safest:
  - Clean your hands
  - Wash your hands with soap and water
  - Wear your mask if you feel sick
  - Stay home when you feel ill
  - Keep windows open for fresh air when you are able

What to know

- This page provides essential information about seasonal influenza (flu) vaccines, including their purpose and effectiveness.
- Everyone 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine every season with rare exceptions.
- Vaccination is particularly important for people who are at higher risk of serious complications from flu.
- People with egg allergy may receive an egg-free vaccine based on your age, health, and other relevant information for their age and health status.
- Flu vaccine prevents illness of influenza and related doctor's visits each year.
