- One-directional borrowing for the seasonal influenza vaccine has been approved for the upcoming season.




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VFC Pediatric Maternal RSV Vaccine Is Now Available to Order in ASIIS



- RSV ABRYSVO® is **OPEN** for ASIIS orders for VFC-eligible pediatric maternal patients. The Order Set can be found in ASIIS VOMS as "RSV/NIRSEVIMAB - VFC."
- Minimum order of 1 with a cap of 5 for each order.
 - If there are any special circumstances or events, Please contact your Immunization Program Specialist (IPS) or ArizonaVFC@azdhs.gov for further guidance.



Immunizations are not recommended to protect infants outside of RSV season. Infants born in these months should receive **nirsevimab** in October.

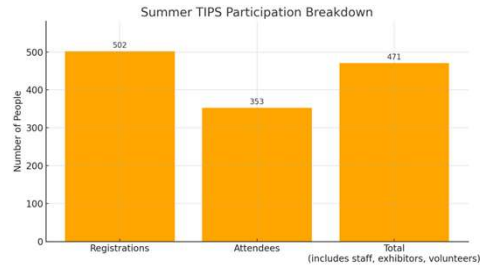

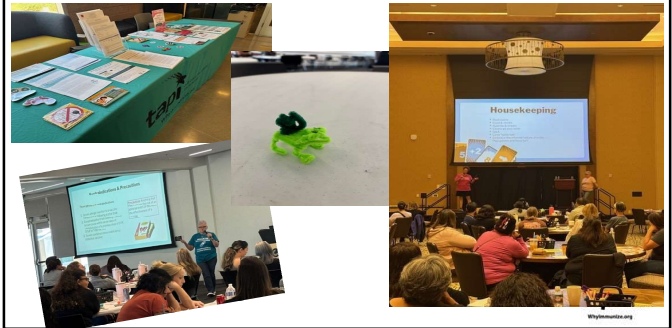

Moniz has been serving as acting director of the agency since January. She was nominated to be the CDC director in March after the Trump administration withdrew the original nominee, David Wokosin, MD, from consideration when it became clear the district from the votes to clear Senate confirmation.

First nonphysician director in more than 70 years.

Report from the Vaccine Integrity Project



Background

As discussed in the previous report, the Vaccine Integrity Project was established to address the challenges of maintaining a strong vaccine infrastructure across the US. The project was led by a team of experts in vaccine policy, infrastructure, and communication. The project's findings are presented in this report, which provides a comprehensive overview of the current state of the vaccine infrastructure and offers strategies for maintaining and improving it.

On 7/15, the Senate Homeland Security & Governmental Affairs Committee held a hearing to examine "Weak of the Vaccine Injury".



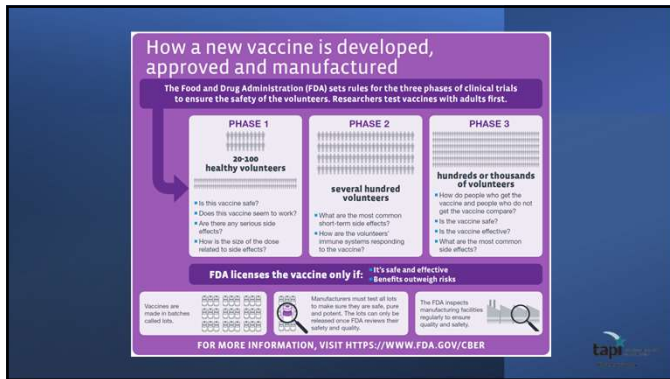
Majority witnesses shared personal accounts of severe health outcomes—including chronic illness, neurological symptoms, and sudden death—that they attribute to vaccination of their children and criticized perceived delays and obstacles within the Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (VICP).



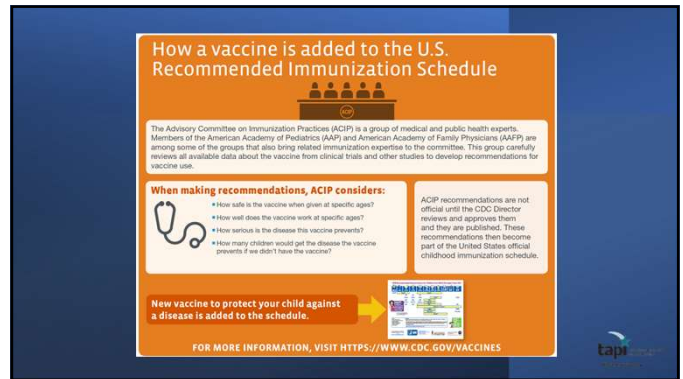
Many public health experts and officials raised concerns about the hearing, highlighting anecdotal testimony without broader scientific context, including information on vaccine safety and data on rare but serious vaccine injuries, could risk misleading the public and further undermining confidence in.

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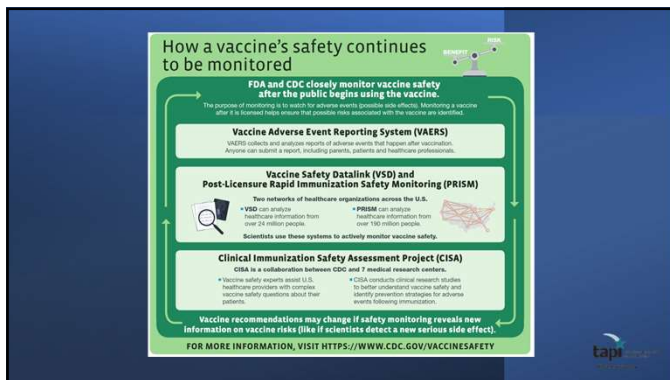
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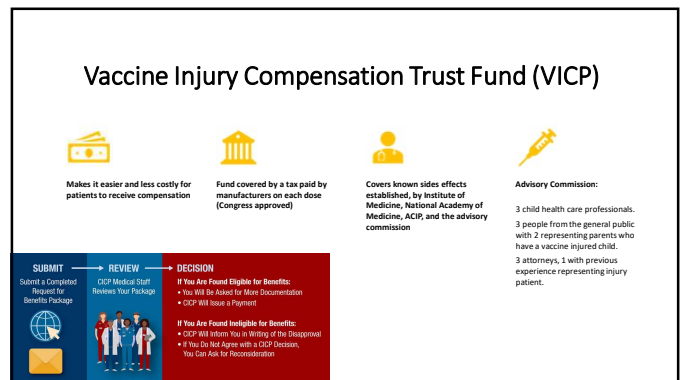
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Manufacturer Liability

- VICP covers known rare adverse events in table.
- Patients can choose to bypass VICP and petition traditional court system but take on higher burden of proof.
- Manufacturer liable for negligence in manufacturing process.

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Patient Information Statement Given with Every Dose

Start having conversations with parents about the VIS. Consider giving copies and referring to it as their "package insert". Have patients read it before every dose.

MMR Vaccine (Measles, Mumps, and Rubella): What You Need to Know

1. Why get vaccinated?

Measles, mumps, and rubella are highly contagious viruses that can cause serious illness and even death. Getting vaccinated helps protect you and your family from these diseases.

2. Talk with your health care provider

Before getting vaccinated, talk with your health care provider about the benefits and risks of the vaccine. They can help you decide if the vaccine is right for you.

3. MMR vaccine

MMR vaccine is a combination vaccine that protects against measles, mumps, and rubella. It is given in two doses: one at age 12-23 months and another at age 4-6 years.

4. Risks of a vaccine reaction

Like all medicines, MMR vaccine can cause side effects. However, the benefits of the vaccine far outweigh the risks. Serious allergic reactions are very rare.

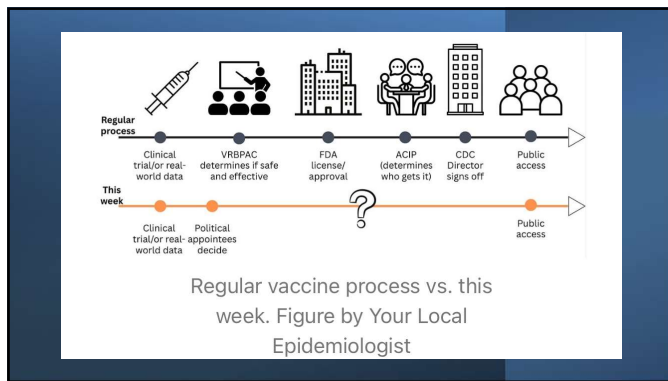
5. The National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program

If you believe your child has been injured by a vaccine, you can file a claim with the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program (VICP).

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New ACIP June Meeting

- Removed 17 members, Dr Wharton and CDC team that staffed ACIP
- Changed the up to 2-year vetting process previously used and appointed 8 new members (many with known anti-vaccine viewpoints)
- Suspended working groups
- June 25/26 meeting:
 - Reviewed recommendations for COVID-19, RSV, MMRV, Flu, Chikungunya
 - Voted on RSV monoclonal for infants & vaccine for pregnancy, flu - no thimerosal containing flu vaccine
- New Workgroups:
 - Examine CDC's Recommended **Child and Adolescent** Schedule to re-evaluate the number of recommended vaccines, potential vaccine interactions, the cumulative impact of vaccine ingredients, and the relative timing of different vaccines
 - review vaccines whose recommendations have not been **reconsidered** in more than **7 years** (e.g., hepatitis B and MMR vaccines).

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Numerous Federal Laws Relate Back to ACIP Recommendations, Placing Them at Automatic Risk Should Schedule Changes Occur

- Immigration and Nationality Act:** establishing immunization requirements for foreign persons entering the United States (8 U.S.C. § 1182)
- Vaccine Injury Compensation Program:** requiring the addition of ACIP recommended vaccines to the program (42 U.S.C. § 300aa-14)
- Education and Outreach Campaign Regarding Preventive Benefits:** requiring the Secretary to establish an educational campaign including for ACIP recommendations (42 U.S.C. § 300u-12)
- Coverage of Preventive Health Services:** requiring coverage of ACIP-recommended immunizations by private payers (42 U.S.C. § 300gg-13)
- Prescription Drug Benefits (Medicare Part D),** 42 U.S.C. §§ 1395w-102, 1395w-114, 1395w-115, prohibiting beneficiary cost sharing
- Program for Distribution of Pediatric Vaccines (Vaccines for Children):** requiring states to operate a VFC program, providing a vaccine entitlement to eligible children (42 U.S.C. §§ 1396d, 1396s)
- Community Preventive Services Task Force; USPSTF:** requiring coordination with ACIP (42 U.S.C. §§ 280g-10, 299b-4)
- Medicare Part B:** including assessment of vaccination status as part of Annual Wellness Visit (42 U.S.C. § 1395x) (*does not* tie coverage to recommendations)
- Veterans' Health Administration (VHA) / VA Health Care System:** defining veteran's benefits to include ACIP-recommended immunizations (38 U.S.C. § 1701)

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Emerging Leaders for Evidence Based Best Practices

- CIDRAP:** The **Vaccine Integrity Project** has established a Steering Committee comprising eight leading public health and policy experts to make recommendations for how vaccine use can remain grounded in the best available science, free from external influence and focused on optimizing protection of individuals, families, and communities against vaccine-preventable diseases.
 - Professional associations establishing a best practice council
 - Will tackle covid vaccine recommendations this fall
 - Partnership with **AAP** on childhood schedule
 - Partnership with **NAHS** on adult schedule

Public health leaders, distrustful of RFK Jr., stand up project to defend vaccines

S+ The U.S. needs an alternative organization to protect vaccine guidance from political interference

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Other States Forming State/Regional Groups

Regional Cooperation:

- Officials from Maine, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and New York have discussed forming a regional vaccine advisory group for northeastern states.
- California, Oregon, and Washington have publicly condemned the recent dismissal of ACIP members and called on other states to join them in addressing these changes.


Impact on State Laws:

- State laws in Vermont and Minnesota, for example, rely on ACIP recommendations for vaccine administration by pharmacists and dentists and some for schools.
