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MEASLES

Measles is a highly contagious viral illness that causes fever and rash. It is spread through the air by an infected person breathing, coughing or sneezing and is so contagious that any child or adult who is exposed to it and is not immune will probably get the disease.

Information for Healthcare Providers

Current Situation (last updated 6/24/2026)

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Maricopa County Reports 16th Measles Case of 2026, with Public Exposure

Public Health Posted on June 24, 2026

Maricopa County Department of Public Health (MCDPH) has confirmed one new measles case in a Maricopa County resident.

The total number of confirmed measles cases in Maricopa County this year has now reached 16, just under halfway through the year. This is significantly higher than the annual average of one case per year for the last 30 years. The continued spread of measles highlights the ongoing risk of local transmission during this outbreak, and the importance of vaccination and early symptom recognition.

Public notifications are issued when exposed individuals cannot be identified, so people who may have been in a public setting at the same time as an infectious person can learn of their potential exposure and take protective steps. MCDPH will provide public notification via the media and update its [online list of public exposure sites](#) when additional public exposures are identified.

Public exposure site

People who were at the following locations at the listed date and time may have been exposed to measles and should watch for symptoms. The measles virus can survive in the air for up to two hours, and the listed exposure times listed include that extended period.

Measles Outbreak

- Mohave County cases centered around Arizona/Utah border communities in Northern Mohave County
- Mohave County cases stats:
 - Total of outbreak cases: **285**
 - Median age of cases: **12 y/o**
 - Hospitalizations: **20**
 - **97%** of cases without valid dose of MMR vaccine prior to illness
 - MMR vaccine doses from 08/01/25-06/08/26: **1,115**
- End of outbreak criteria:
 - No longer detected in wastewater & 42 days (two incubation periods) with no new cases
 - Outbreak declared over on June 11, 2026

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June 2026: Federal Vaccine Policy Snapshot

ACIP - overview of changes that may affect guidance, coverage, and state planning.

June ACIP meeting canceled due to lawsuit

- HHS seeking expedited appeal in ACIP-related lawsuit, raising concerns about timely recommendations before fall respiratory season

Newly posted ACIP charter:

- Weakens clarity on publication of recommendations
- Changes membership and adds non-traditional groups
- Gives more discretion over meeting timing
- Suggests increased political influence over ACIP structure & VFC

WHY IT MATTERS

Possible delay in Flu/COVID seasonal vaccine approval. Schedule change timing, expertise and coverage.

ARIZONA/TAPI

Arizona clinicians will need clear state agency guidance as national authority evolves, especially before fall respiratory virus campaigns.

May cause some to pause fall ordering until clarity.

AHIP extended coverage 2027

VFC availability:

CDC decisions could be made by political appointees vs evidence based.



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June 2026: Federal Vaccine Policy Snapshot

CDC Block Grant - overview of changes that may affect guidance, coverage, and state planning.

CDC informs states funding tied to parental freedom priorities

- CDC required programs to align with federal priorities.
- Priorities include "parental authority," potentially affecting vaccination policy.
- Funding implications were referenced but not explicit (increase and level funding proposed for 2027 immunization programs)

FDA – VRBPAC approved Moderna's MFLUSIVA, the first mRNA flu vaccine. No movement on approval of 2026/2027 flu vaccines.

WHY IT MATTERS

Immunization program workplans to remove equity language and include parental choice education.

Timing may interrupt Moderna flu launch.

ARIZONA/TAPI

May reduce funds for some programs. Others have increase in proposed budgets

Likely push for more shared clinical education rather than clear immunization recommendations.

Uncertainty for new flu without ACIP.



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June 2026: State Vaccine Policy Snapshot

Legislature – recap of bills worked this session.

- HB2005 unprofessional conduct vaccination status
- HB2086 no vaccine/mask mandates government – Governor's veto
- HB2248 no medical interventions requirement – Governor's veto
- HB2332 unprofessional conduct mRNA
- HB2335 unprofessional conduct vaccine status
- HB2774 medical examiner vaccine report to ADHS
- SB1011 medical examiners SUIDS and vaccine status – Governor's veto
- SB1016 employers' religious exemption any medical product
- SB1194 not deny care based on vaccine status
- SB1212 value-based payments for immunization measures – Governor's veto
- SB2974 biological weapons prohibition; crime
- SB1557 informed consent, medical interventions
- HB2056 medical mandates; right to refuse – Not moving to Ballot

WHY IT MATTERS

Despite numerous antivaccine bills with partisan support we were able to minimize impact

ARIZONA/TAPI

Yay!

Requesting funding summer/Fall to have campaigns ready to launch.

Preplanning webinars/meetings with professional associations.



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June 2026: State Vaccine Policy Snapshot

Legislature – prepping for next session

Growing problem:

- More antivax legislators
- MAHA quieter on national vaccine issues due to WH pressure, so shifting efforts to agency influence and state legislatures
- New AZ MAHA PAC
 - As of Friday –will know more next week.
 - “We exist to elect Republicans to the House and Senate who will champion the MAHA agenda in 2026 and beyond.”

WHY IT MATTERS

Next session antivaccine efforts will be coordinated and well funded.

Bill sponsors up for reelection – could come back more experienced with significant resources

ARIZONA/TAPI

Requesting funds in Fall to have campaigns ready to launch.

Preplanning webinars/meetings with professional associations.

Need Representative changes in districts 25 & 29.

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June 2026: Vaccine Reimbursement

Health Plan Advocacy – Pairing clinicians with health plan medical directors to start the dialog

Growing **payment** problems:

- Vaccine reimbursement not keeping up with price increases (still at or above cost but small margins)
- Aetna 60% reduction in admin fees
- Numerous private and AHCCCS errors
 - BCBS swapping MMRV and MMR + V payments
 - AHCCCS age gap on DTaP and Tdap

TAPI/AzAAP/AzAFP workgroup

- Several Peds and FP interested in working on the problem
- Will be following up this month to get a workgroup kicked off

WHY IT MATTERS

Payments not always covering cost.
Less Federal pressure to adequately cover.
Coverage confusion creating gaps.

ARIZONA/TAPI

Developing use case guides for new counseling codes (no vaccine given) to send to professional associations.

Concern offices are incentivized for not immunizing - \$10 admin fee vs \$30 counseling payment.
